

**ABSTRACT**

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**A Literature Review: Study Descriptive Police Knowledge and Attitudes on cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR)**

**Background:** Cardiac arrest is a sudden loss of heart function in order to maintain normal circulation which is indicated by the absence of a pulse. Therefore, the police as people who are often asked for help in public places, absolutely have a good knowledge and attitude regarding cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

**Objective:** This study aimed to describe police knowledge and attitudes about cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) through a review of various literatures (literature review).

**Methods:** The study used a literature review using the PubMed database, digital reference Garuda, and Google Scholar with the keywords such as Police; Basic Life Support (BLS); Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR); Knowledge; and Attitude.

**Result:** Based on the six articles, it was found that police knowledge of CPR in Indonesia is sufficient (53,5%) and in the USA was sufficient (67,6%), while the police attitude towards CPR in Indonesia was good (40,8%) and in the USA was good (49%).

**Conclusion:** Based on this literature review, it was found the police knowledge and attitudes about CPR by attending were lacking. So, it is necessary to increase police knowledge and attitudes about CPR by attending some seminars or trainings related to CPR.
